### **BACKGROUND:**

TEXTBOOK AND INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS POLICY 4.100 states that, "No local school board or publisher may participate in a pilot program of materials being considered for adoption during the 18-month period before the official adoption of the materials by the State Textbook Commission. Despite that long-standing policy, districts in SCORE's LIFT network were permitted to continue pilots using Amplify, El Education and Great Minds Wit and Wisdom throughout 2018 and straight through the adoption process. (See LIFT INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS GUIDEBOOK )

While LIFT-piloted curricula **Amplify, El Education and Wit & Wisdom** failed almost 100% of grade bands in Tennessee's **first and second** rounds of textbook reviews conducted by Tennessee teachers, these materials still appeared on the state's approved list after review scores were overridden by the Department of Education.

### **TIMELINE OF CHANGES:**

### June 1, 2019

**Textbook reviewers submitted their first "test review" of a textbook to the Commissioner.** This would be the first date TDOE would see that their preferred HQIMs were not likely to make it on the approved list.

## June 3, 2019

Two days after the results of the test reviews were known to the Department, they notified publishers of an "update to the scoring protocol" that would make it harder to fail a textbook. Previously, if a majority of reviewers of a textbook (3/5) failed any section of the book, then the entire book failed. Based on the new rules set to go into effect one week later, a majority of reviewers (3/5) must fail the same section of that book before it could be failed.

### June 11, 2019

The new scoring changes were added to the 6/11 Textbook Commission meeting agenda and were adopted.

### July 2, 2019

The final results of the **first round** of textbook reviews were made known to the Commissioner and to publishers. All three of the programs used in SCORE's pilot districts received failing scores:

- CKLA Amplify failed all grades 1-8 except grade 4;
- Great Minds Wit and Wisdom failed all grades 1-12 except grade 7;
- Open Up El Education failed all grades 1-5;

# **August - September 2019**

Commissioner Schwinn replaced Lacey Noel as textbook coordinator, hired Lisa Coons, then unilaterally took the following actions without authorization of the Textbook Commission:

- Halted the textbook review process indefinitely just days before the approved calendar said it was to conclude, despite Commission Rule 0520-05-01-.10 (5) that states that the review process must align with the timeline approved by the Commission. Department officials argued that, as long as they met the last date shown on the calendar, they were still in compliance with regulation. Multiple publishers were disadvantaged by the Department's actions and complained to textbook officials;
- Commissioned, without properly bidding, a Johns Hopkins Institute for Education Policy review of the quality of scoring produced by Tennessee's first-round textbook reviewers. Per the Institute's website, they are an official partner of CKLA Amplify and Great Minds Wit and Wisdom two of the three programs favored by the Department and SCORE;

- **Dismissed all first-round reviewers** based on advice from Johns Hopkins;
- **Created new criteria** for hiring new reviewers. First-round reviewers could only be hired back if they passed "a more rigorous" reviewer test written by the Department;
- **Recruited new reviewers** to apply for second round re-reviews, and **set new test "cut scores"** to weed out reviewers deemed unacceptable by the Department;
- Selected new reviewers to complete the second round or "re-reviews" -- with the assistance of Commission Chairman Neil Durbin. Note that Durbin, also Director of Schools for Dyersburg City, never disclosed that his own district was engaged in a pilot using El Education curriculum, one of the three preferred by SCORE and a beneficiary of the Department's adjustment of review scores;
- TDOE trained new reviewers using "ELA experts to teach how to review and score using the rubric";
- Directed that second-round reviews be conducted "as a group" and in the presence of department officials,
  contrary to the prior practice of reviewing materials independently and from a remote location. Asst.
   Commissioner Coons claims that reviewers "maintained their independence" even while being monitored and
  directed by the Department.
- Overrode second-round failing review scores for CKLA Amplify, EL Education and most grade bands of Wit and Wisdom. Department officials simply declared the materials "passed" in the absence of passing scores and added them to the approved list;
- Created, after State Board acceptance of the approved list, a new waiver process to benefit the still-failed grade bands of Wit and Wisdom and El Education. In all, 72 district waivers were granted to encourage districts to adopt the maximum number of unapproved, preferred materials. In stark contrast, the previous Social Studies adoption saw only three districts request waivers.
- Granted over 70 waivers for previously unapproved materials.
