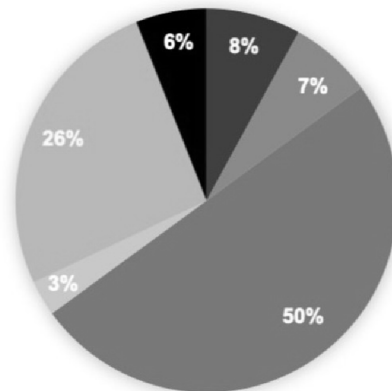

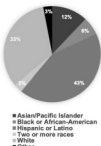

SOE Welcomes Future School Leaders of Color to New Program

More than 60 percent of public school students in California are Black or Latinx, but only 20 percent of school administrators reflect these numbers. To increase representation, SOE launched a fellowship program for aspiring principals of color in partnership with the Diversity in Leadership Institute, founded by alumna Laura McGowan-Robinson Ed.D. '16.



Closing the Achievement Gap for Black Students in L.A.

Last summer, SOE founded the Cultivating Young Black Excellence program with the Los Angeles Urban League and other partners to match Black tutors and mentors from LMU with Black K-12 students in L.A. The result: 70 percent of participants met or exceeded their academic goals.



Using Research-Proven Methods for Educator Training

SOE is an early adopter of mixed-reality simulations, a technology that lets future educators practice their skills in realistic mock-up settings. We now use it to train tomorrow's teachers, school leaders, and mental health professionals.



Leading a District During Covid-19

In July 2020, Hilda Maldonado Ed.D. '21 became a superintendent for the first time—and the first Latina to hold this role in California's Santa Barbara Unified School District. She shared her thoughts about leading the Latino-majority school district during the pandemic.
